From the Pastor

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Is our Faith greater than our fears?

Dear Parish Family,

In the Gospel today, Jesus calms a storm in the sea. In doing so, he calms the fears of the apostles who are in the wind tossed boat. The appearance of Jesus walking in the storm is strange for the apostles. They mistakenly think they are seeing a ghost.

Jesus reassures them that it is he. They should not be afraid. In the first reading from 1Kings, Elijah meets God in the small whisper. Elijah is facing an internal storm in his heart. He is upset, frightened and he is fleeing. It is in the midst of storms and in small unassuming ways that we are presented with the opportunity to meet God.

Is our Faith greater than our fears?

The faith of which I speak is more than doctrine faith. The faith we profess on Sunday when we profess the Creed is doctrinal faith. The faith of which I am addressing is a personal faith. This personal faith is a deep relationship with the Lord which dwells in the depths of our hearts. This faith is nourished by receiving the Eucharist, by praying the scriptures in the context of community of the church. This personal faith is sustained and shared in the community of the church. This faith is so much part of us that we cannot really separate ourselves from it. It is this deep faith that sustains us through the storms.

Storms are part of our lives; we have faced natural storms such as hurricane Sandy for which many are still recovering. Many of us have emotional storms such as the breaking up of a marriage, the loss of a relationship, the death of loved ones, the loss of a home, the loss of a job. Many go through bouts with depression and anxiety. Stress at work, worry about home and financial concerns can have us in major internal turmoil.

When storms of any kind happen, some people feel left alone. They think God has left them. Thus thinking that only when the sun is shining and the birds are singing that God is present. According to our sacred text, this thinking is not correct. Notice that Peter comes walking toward Jesus in the storm. Elijah meets the Lord during his internal struggle. Jesus is not abandoned in the Garden or on Good Friday. Peter's error was taking his focus away from Jesus and placing his focus on the storm. The storm made him fearful. Focus on Jesus gave him strength and hope. Let's place our focus on Jesus as we face difficulties. Is our faith in him greater than our fear? The emotional feeling of God's closeness or God's absence cannot be trusted. Faith is more than a feeling. Faith is a conviction that God is present.

So, where are you in this story? Are you one of the apostles in the boat? Is your life being tossed here and there and you feel left alone? Are you Peter who cannot focus on Christ but who is too distracted by the storm? There is a feeling in many to run away when they are in the middle of a storm. They avoid the Eucharist or praying because they feel that God is angry or will punish them. Let us move beyond our own narrow understanding and embrace the sacred text. Jesus is present. Jesus is not always present in the way we would like. Jesus is present in the way we may need his presence. Suffering comes, change happens, injustices are common. Sometimes we are protected from these sufferings and sometimes we are in the midst of the pain. While Jesus tells us that we will suffer in the world, Jesus does promise us his presence. Where you ask is his presence in times of suffering? First you will find the Lord in the Eucharist. I cannot repeat this enough. Jesus is found in the Eucharist. Attendance at Mass is essential for all who love the Lord. Jesus is to be found in the sacred text, the gospel and in our prayers and reflections on these readings. Jesus is found in the body of the assembly that is in us. When we experience kindness, understanding, direction, mercy, a person who cries with us and is compassionate, we are encountering the Lord in that person. There are people who God sends among us.

So, where are you? If you're thinking of God as one that is on a cloud up in heaven, I ask you to rethink this image. Jesus is more a verb rather than a noun, God is dynamic. God is found among those who love and is merciful regardless of whom they may be. So, in our storms we are not alone. Storms invite us to trust, to have faith and to find our spiritual life growth.

ASSUMPTION

This coming Tuesday, August 15th we celebrate the Great Feast of the Assumption of Mary. We celebrate the memory of Mary because of her singular vocation of giving flesh to the Word of God in the Mystery of the Incarnation of God among us who is Christ Jesus. Today the Church celebrates the great feast of the Assumption of Mary. This is an ancient celebration found in many Christian communities. The Greek, Antiochian and many other Orthodox Churches, celebrate the Sleep of Mary. The Lutheran and Episcopal Communities celebrate the memory of Mary, therefore this is a good day to celebrate Mary ecumenically. The reason for our veneration and love for Mary is Jesus.

The Feast of the Assumption, while celebrating the taking of Mary to heaven, we also celebrate Christ. By recalling the Resurrection of Christ and the Assumption of Mary, we too are calling to mind the great promise of our own resurrection from the dead and life of the world to come. The second reading from St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians speaks of our promised resurrection. If Christ is risen from the dead so we will rise from the dead. Mary is seen as the first disciple of Christ. She, as disciple and first member of the Church, is raised from the dead because of her faithfulness to the Gospel. Just as Mary has been raised, we also will be raised from the dead. We profess the belief in our resurrection every time we profess the Creed when we say "We believe in the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."

While the Assumption of Mary is a great event, scripture and tradition tell us of the assumption of Elijah found in 2Kings 2:11-12. The gift of assumption into heaven was reserved for exceptionally holy people. Mary's vocation is singular. She is the woman who gave humanity to the Word of God. We know the Word of God is Jesus. Thus, because of her vocation as the Mother of God, she is also recognized as the Mother of the Church and Mother to all the disciples of Christ. Her vocation in accomplishing the Incarnation is remembered everyday when we pray the Angelus. As a reminder of the Incarnation, Churches rang bells in the morning, noontime and in the evening.

The Gospel gives us the great Marian Canticle: The Magnificat. In this prayer, Mary praises God for the gift of Mercy shown to God's people throughout the ages. This prayer expresses Mary's gratitude to God for her singular vocation which is her role among us. This prayer is said everyday by all who pray the Divine Office, ordained, religious and lay. Read this canticle, memorize it and make it part of your heart. Use it to praise and thank God for all you have received. Do you believe in your own resurrection from the dead?

The celebration of the Assumption invites us to reflect on the great mystery of the Resurrection of Christ, our own future resurrection and the vocation of every disciple to give flesh to the Word of God by living in thought, word and deed, the faith we profess. Perhaps we can remember that every act of mercy, every kindness, every word of truth we utter, every act of service we render is a way of giving flesh to the Word of God. Pray the rosary, it will help you reflect on the great mysteries of our redemption in Christ Jesus.
