## ADVENT 2017

Advent 2017 began on December 3rd. The word advent means to come. Thus the Liturgical season of Advent invites us to focus our attention on the two comings of Christ. From now until December 17th, the sacred text of the season focus on the coming of Christ at the end of time. The first two weeks have as their goal the focus on the Kingdom of God. This time period accents the line from the Creed which says "we believe in the resurrection of the dead and life of the world to come." The readings refer to this second coming as a time of judgment and the final victory of good over evil. The language of Advent is filled with words such as: longing, waiting, expecting, looking forward to, making up a dreaming and looking for the Kingdom of God. Liturgical Prayer during Advent expresses the longing for the completion of the coming of the Kingdom of God among us. Although Jesus has redeemed us and initiated God's Reign, we are still waiting to experience the fullness of the Kingdom of God. The Kingdom for which we long is to be marked by peace, reconciliation, healing, the end of war and the beginning of goodness for all. As evidenced by the crime rate, the continued war in the Middle East, the persecution of people of goodwill, the raise in racism, polarization of people, the rise in hatred, the Kingdom, while in the hearts of many, has not yet fully arrived. Advent prays for the fulfillment of God's Kingdom, longs for the kingdom and encourages all people to live and work towards the kingdom of God by living lives of love, justice, mercy and peace. It is for this we pray in the Our Father, "Your Kingdom come."

Advent is a call to prepare the way of the Lord. Reconciliation and penance is the perfect way to prepare for the Coming of the Lord although Advent is not a penitential season. Advent is a season of hope. For what are you hoping? Knowing our hopes helps us to realize what is not actualized in our lives. What is your wish at this time? Some wish that their problems will cease. Some are longing just to be. Some wish they knew what direction their lives should take. Some are longing for healing of their health issues. Some are longing for reconciliation with a loved one. Some are trying to manage anger issues. Some are longing for fulfillment. Some are longing to know that their lives matter. Whatever the hope is, whatever the longing is, it speaks to us of an unfulfilled longing. Do not dull these feelings. Do not run and turn on Christmas music to feel better. Rather, let your heart seek for what it truly wants. Our hearts are longing for communion with the Lord. Face yourself and face God in this season of Hope. We are reminded that each of our desires is another way of longing for Jesus in our lives. Only God can satisfy us. Only God can give our lives meaning. Only the Lord is our peace. Only in Christ do we have the Kingdom of God. In the end, we all long for God, who can fulfill all our hopes.

Blessed Advent.

# From the Pastor

Dear Parish Community,

Today is the Third Sunday in Advent. Traditionally this Sunday has been called Joyful Sunday. We light the pink candle today. Liturgically, pink is a symbol of joy. In Latin this day was called Gaudate Sunday or joyful Sunday.

The reading speaks to us about joy. In the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, we read: "The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring glad tidings to the poor....I rejoice heartily in the Lord, in God is the joy of my soul..." While joy is proclaimed by the prophet, the real situation for the people was anything but joy. The exiles returned to find the community living in poverty and injustice. The Gospel reading comes to us from Mark. In this passage, John the Baptist is questioned by the religious leaders. It is not a happy moment for him. John, even when opposed that he has been sent to testify to the light. For John, the darkness that seemed to veil all humanity was lifting and those who wanted that light are called to repentance. The responsorial psalm comes from Luke 1:46 and following. This is commonly known as Mary's Magnificat. In this great canticle, Mary is filled with joy as she says; "My soul rejoices in my God." Mary's situation could not have been worse. She is with child and not yet married, living in ancient Israel. Her life is quite upset. Yet, she rejoices. In the second reading from Paul's first Letter to the Thessalonians, Paul says; "Rejoice always." The situation faced by the Thessalonians is not an easy one. The community is divided and is in need of direction, yet Paul tells them to rejoice. How does one hear these readings?

What is the difference between joy and happiness? Is there a difference? At this time of the year, there are many people who are not happy. Some feel guilty because they are not happy. Some feel they cannot sing Christmas Carols or attend parties because they are not in a happy mood. Others are going through the motions of being happy because their hearts are far from happiness. This year in particular presents a difficulty for many people. Grief, loss, fear, anger, emptiness and spiritual dryness are being experienced by many. Some have lost loved ones. Economically some have lost their employment. Nationally we seem to be a divided nation. Internationally there is the constant threat of war and unrest. In our city, there is the daily fear of violence. In light of these grave realities, how do we hear the message of joy?

Joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. (cf Galatians 5:22f). The Joy of Christmas is found in Jesus. Jesus is the cause of our Joy. He is the cause of our Joy because he is God dwelling among us. In Jesus we see God revealed as one with us. (Emmanuel) In Jesus, we see God as one who embraces the human experience with its joys, sufferings, unanswered questions and its struggles. We see in Jesus the God who conquers death in all of its forms. Joy is internal. It is not contingent on our surrounding. Joy has nothing to do with "everything being fine." One can be filled with joy yet be very sad. Joy that comes from the Lord is not like the happiness of the world.

Happiness is often dependent on the surroundings. We may be happy if we are healthy. We may be happy if all that we planned comes to pass. Happiness may come when things go the way we want. One can be happy and not be joy filled. Happiness can be ruined if one detail is not executed perfectly or correctly. Joy remains deep in our inner most being. Joy can be internal, silent and hope giving. Happiness can be external. I would think there was little happiness for Mary and Joseph on that first Christmas. Being in a stable, having a child born in a stable surrounded by animals and strange people was not a happy situation. Yet, there was Joy. Christ comes not when things are perfect but when he is needed.

Christmas Joy is based on our faith, not on a hallmark greeting card. Is Jesus the one who is to come into the world? If our answer is yes, then we have cause for joy even if we are weeping. If we are growing in the Spirit and see our lives as ordered to salvation, then the coming of Christ is a cause of our joy. We need not decorate. We need not put up the lights. We need not go to the parties. We need not put up a Christmas tree. However, we do need to celebrate our joy in the Christmas Mass. We do need to participate at the Eucharist. In the Eucharist resides the one who is the cause of our joy. Emmanuel, who is God with us, is the cause of our Joy and the reason for our hope. So, no matter how you feel, how sad you may be, come to Eucharist, surround yourself with people, hear the singing of the carols of faith and find consolation, hope and yes, even Joy in Christ.

Let us pray:

Father send us your gift of the Holy Spirit that we may rejoice in Jesus; God with us, even in suffering and disappointment and set back.
