

From the Pastor

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Dear Parish Family,

Today is the Thirty-First Sunday in Ordinary Time. The first reading from the Book of the Prophet Malachi and the Gospel are pointed, direct and correcting. The readings are addressed to religious leadership of Malachi's time and to the religious leaders of the time of Jesus. Secondly, they are addressed to the attitude with which we, both leaders and people, practice our faith.

"Practice what you preach," comes to mind when I read these texts. Probably the most condemning of the believer is the lack of putting into practice the good behaviors which one's religious community teaches. In the first reading, the leaders are telling the people what they should be doing, while the leaders themselves are not listening to the voice of God. In the Gospel, leadership found in some of the Pharisees is criticized by Jesus. It is not the belief system which comes under fire from Jesus, but lack of practice and compassion found in the self-styled religious attitudes which causes Jesus to castigate them.

For Jesus, religious leaders must be at the service of humanity. The leadership must lead by good example as well as with words. The leader must be proud of his position but compassionate towards those whom he serves. The leaders are not to misuse their position of trust which the community has invested in them. If an error is made, the leader must ask for forgiveness.

Let us look at these texts in light of our own religious leadership. From my perspective, there are many good priests who give of themselves to their ministry. Some of our priests, even in this diocese, have endangered their lives for the good of the people. Many have been an inspiration to others. However, sad to say, some have been the exact opposite. In some cases, people have walked away from the Church because of some of these leaders. Granted that all are human and all of us have not so good days from time to time. I think we cannot excuse too lightly those who have caused scandal, hurt others and mistreated children. Nor can we excuse those who have used their ecclesiastical titles to advance their own self interests. Nor can we excuse a priest or sister or a brother or a deacon who presents themselves as self righteous, "holier than thou." The priest, the sister, the brother and deacon must realize that they depend on God's grace to preserve them in their ministry. Left on their own, they will falter. In order to live the life of a priest or a sister or a brother or a deacon, they must realize their lives are in the mode of constant and ongoing conversion to the mind and heart of the Lord Jesus. Once they think they know the Lord and that they are fully converted, you can be assured they are not listening to the Word of God.

While there is a public leadership in our community, there is also us, the members of the Body of Christ. The members of the laity who also exercise a great deal of faith leadership in homes, workplaces, those of us who pray, participate at the Eucharist and know the faith, are recognized as people whose lives should reflect the beliefs and the behavior they espouse on a Sunday morning. When we fail to give good example, we too give scandal. This is an area that we are most prone to fail. We must reduce the gap between the faith we profess and the not so good attitudes which are expressed in our speech, actions and even in our thoughts which are expressed in many non verbal ways. So, racist attitudes, lack of compassion, lack of kindness toward those we may not like, holding on to hurts and refusing forgiveness, the refusal to correct behavior, makes us a cause of scandal. So, for those who wish to be disciples of the Lord, we need to practice what we preach. When we fail at this call, we are invited to admit our fault and ask for forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. It is not only the priests, bishops or the sisters or the deacons who have caused scandal and hurt in the community, it is all who profess faith on Sunday morning and forget about it on Monday morning.

WE ARE CALLED TO PRACTICE WHAT WE PREACH!

OPENING OF THE MASS BOOK
FOR THE FIRST SIX MONTHS OF 2018
JANURAY THROUGH JUNE

The Mass Book for the first six months of 2018, January through June, will open on Tuesday, November 14th in the Parish House (Rectory Office) from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM and from 6:00 PM to 7:30 PM. Everyone is asked to kindly abide by and respect the process. Please take a number as you enter the office. You must come in person, unfortunately telephone requests cannot be taken. If you are obtaining intentions for others, these masses will be included as part of your allowance.

As you know, there are only 52 Saturdays and Sundays a year and the request for Saturday/Sunday Masses exceeds the number of Saturday/Sunday Masses. Every individual may request ONE Saturday/Sunday Mass and two weekday masses at the opening of the Mass Book. After the book has been opened ONE WEEK, if one wishes to come to the Rectory to request additional intentions, they are most welcome to do so. This means suppose Mr. & Mrs. X come to request mass intentions. Mr. X may request three intentions ONE of which can be on a Saturday/Sunday and two for weekdays. Mrs. X can do the same. She too can have three mass intentions. ONE for Saturday/Sunday and two for weekdays. Thus the couple can have a total of six mass intentions at the opening of the book. It is hoped that all of us will exercise charity and compassion for others who, like oneself, may wish to request mass intentions for loved ones. It would be uncharitable for a family to circumvent our policy by staging five or six people requesting a mass on Saturday/Sunday for the same intention, thus excluding others.

While we all have days and times which we may want, that day and time may not be available, thus we will need to have alternate days and times. Let us remember that the focus of our Mass intentions is for the one for whom we are praying, not for the one requesting the mass. We must also remember that none of us is entitled to a time and day. All requests will be answered to the best of our ability. Masses being too early to too late or not on the day we requested is not a reason for not requesting a mass. Let us remember the focus of our request.

Keeping in mind the focus of our request, we call your attention to the following:

1. The requestors name (the one making the intention for the Mass) need not be printed in our bulletin or announced from the pulpit. When the mass intention is booked, we will take the requestor's name for our records, but this need not be printed in our bulletin or announced from the pulpit. This is an option you can partake of however, it is not necessary. Remember, the focus is on the person or intention of the Mass, not the requesting party.

2. Oftentimes we wish to remember the occasion of a birthday, anniversary, years since passing, etc. as well as a nickname for the person the mass intention is for. This information is not needed and should not be part of the mass intention, therefore, only the baptismal name of the person for whom the mass intention is requested is needed. We need not know your personal reasons for your mass request.

What does it mean to request a mass be offered for our loved one or in thanksgiving for a particular intention? Requesting a mass means that the community pray in a particular way for someone or an intention at the community mass. The church prays for all the dead and all the living at every mass, every day in every Church throughout the world. When you make a mass intention, you are asking the local community to pray in a particular way for someone who is prayed for every day universally. The mass belongs to everyone. The mass is our universal prayer. The celebration of the Eucharist makes the Passion, Death and Resurrection present to us sacramentally every day. Our faith tell us that this sacrifice is of benefit to the living as well as to the dead.
