
REACH OUT

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From the Pastor

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Dear Parish Family,

Who do you confess Jesus to be?

Today is the Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Gospel reading and the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah use the same symbolic language. In both readings we find the symbol of keys. Keys given to a person represents authority. The person holding the keys has the authority. Peter, in the Gospel, is given the Keys of the Kingdom of Heaven. In the first reading, Eliakim is the bearer of the keys of the House of David. The holder of keys must be a father to those whom he serves. He must not be a tyrant. The holder of keys will prohibit or give access to people. The holder of keys must provide safeguard for those he serves.

The image of the keys has been applied to the Papacy of the Catholic Church. Catholics believed that Peter's position was succeeded by others through the years so as to preserve the Apostolic Succession. Catholics believe that the Bishop of Rome is the successor to St. Peter, therefore Catholics trace their roots back to Jesus and the apostles. Similar to Eliakim, the authority of the Pope is one of service to the people. The Pope is to be a father to us. Through the power of the keys, the pope as the chief shepherd can give access or prohibit some of our behaviors for own spiritual welfare. The Pope as the holder of the keys is to strengthen and secure our faith. Among us the Pope is the first confessor to the Resurrection of the Lord. At the end of the day, the conviction of faith in Christ is the key.

Who do you confess Jesus to be?

In the second reading from Romans, Paul marvels at the wisdom and knowledge of God. He states: "Oh the depth of the riches and the wisdom and the knowledge of God! How inscrutable are his judgments and how unsearchable his ways! For who has known the mind of the Lord or who has been his counselor?" Perhaps the inspiration for this statement of Paul is the incarnation. Who could have ever thought that God would enter creation? The normal expectation is that God would be clearly supernatural and totally other. God was to omnipotent and all powerful and totally above creation.

In the Incarnation, God in Jesus, we see God in the midst of the human experience. Jesus is one of us in all things. Jesus gets tired, Jesus becomes annoyed, he suffers and he dies. Jesus is all too human. Peter's confession that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God comes about not only on Peter's insight, but is revealed to Peter to be able to see beyond the humanity of Jesus to something far greater.

Peter confessed that he believed that Jesus is the Christ. His faith had consequences. Peter confession his belief in Christ and was made head of the apostles. He confessed that he loved Jesus and because of his love and faith in Christ, he died for the faith. Faith has consequences. Each of us must answer for him or herself who Jesus is.

If you confess that Jesus is the Christ, then you must live accordingly. The title Christ means the anointed one. It is not the family name of Jesus. Yet, this confession of the identity of Jesus is not a once in a lifetime event. Peter has to answer this question many times. When Peter does not understand what Jesus is trying to teach by example in John 6, Peter will have to ask himself does he still believe that Jesus is the Christ. When he sees Jesus defeated in death on the cross, Peter would have to answer again who Jesus really is. The Christ or the Messiah was expected to be an advocate of the people. The Messiah was expected to establish the Kingdom of God on Earth. In the time of the Messiah there would come the great Peace or the great Shalom. The Messiah was to free the people from tyranny in all its forms. There was no separation between spiritual and worldly effects of the Messiah. The work of the messiah was to bring the world back to God. In short, the messiah would accomplish redemption on all levels. Confessing Jesus as the Christ was a great insight for Peter. Jesus was to carry out his messianic mission in a way no one expected. It was not conceivable that the messiah (the Christ) would suffer and die and in the eyes of the world be defeated. Therefore, to confess Jesus as the messiah had consequences. Could Peter see beyond the Cross to the Resurrection? Could the apostles accept the cost of suffering for the message of the Gospel?

The same is true for us. Many are Catholic by culture and not by deep faith. Culture, family background, teaching and environment does act as agents of helping us to believe, but in the end each of us must answer for oneself who Jesus is. One may know about the faith, this does not make a believer. One may be a priest or bishop or a pope or a lay minister and not faced the question of personal belief. Each of us must accept faith individually and in the community of the Church. The faith must be owned by you personally. It cannot be the faith of your parents or grandparents or the priest or your teacher.

To accept this faith you must be willing to suffer for it and even die for it. You must be willing to share it and pass it on. So, who is Jesus for you? If Jesus is the Messiah, why is he the Messiah for you? If he is not the Messiah then why is he not? If he is the Messiah, how do you live your life as a result of that belief? If you do believe what behaviors are compatible with your belief and what behaviors are not compatible with your messianic belief? The more we live the faith, the more we proclaim the Christ. When our behavior contradicts the faith, the more we betray the mission of Christ.

These groups will focus on what it means to live as disciples of Jesus Christ, and how to live our discipleship in the world today.
