REACH OUT

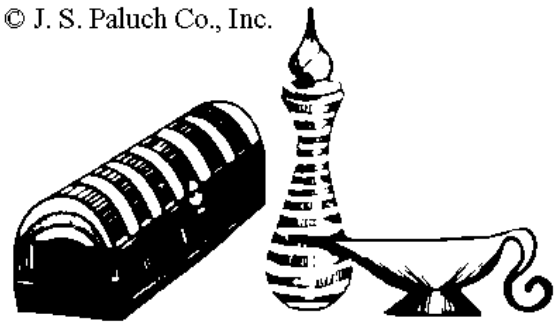

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From the Pastor

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Dear Parish Community,

Who is Jesus? Is he the Messiah? Is Jesus Divine?

Today the Church celebrates the great Feast of the Epiphany. (This feast is on the Official Roman Calendar for January 5. In the United States our Bishops have elected to celebrate this feast on Sunday to underscore its importance.) The feast celebrates two basic themes: Universality of the Gospel message as represented by the arrival of these gentile people, (non-Jewish wise men) the identity of Jesus as Divine King and suffering messiah as represented by the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. There are two other epiphanies in the Gospel: the Baptism of the Lord and the Wedding Feast of Cana.

The word epiphany means: “to show or to manifest.” In the story we see Mary showing the Christ child to the wise men, thus pointing out the universal message of the Gospel. The story is theological and catechetical. The Gospel story of the Epiphany symbolically tells the whole gospel story of Matthew. At the end of the Gospel of Matthew, the Risen Lord sends his disciples to teach and baptize all nations. Here in the story of epiphany, we see a sign of this in the revelation of the Christ child to the wise men of non Jewish peoples. This underscores the universality of the Gospel. While the Messiah was to come to the Jewish people, his mission and redemption was directed to the whole world. Christianity is not wedded to just one nation but to all. In the synoptic gospels a key concern is the identity of Jesus. Is Jesus the prophet? Is Jesus a great teacher? Is Jesus the Messiah?” “Who do people say I am?” is a central question in the synoptic gospels. Today’s feast answers this question in the presentation of the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. The gold is the sign of Kingship, the frankincense is a sign of divinity and the myrrh a sign of sacrifice. The star is a symbol of Judaism. The Star of David is really the Shield of David. The combination of the two shields one on top of the other, as well as one shield being inverted resembles a star. It was the star that led the Magi to Jesus. In the same way the Hebrew texts should point out Jesus to us. The magi, who seemed to have lived in Persia, were probably scholars who searched for wisdom and understanding. Jesus is recognized as the Wisdom of God.

Epiphanies happen when and wherever God is recognized as present among us. Sometimes epiphanies happen when we realize in our hearts and minds a profound truth which we may have known on some level yet all of a sudden, this truth affects our lives for the better. It is called a WOW moment. At other times a person, or even a child, utters words which we feel were addressed directly to us and we realize that God has spoken through another person. At other times, some ones unselfish example of kindness moves us to do the same for another person.

Where does God manifest his presence? Where in your life have you met God? Who are the people in your life who bear for you the face of Jesus? Epiphanies happen when we least expect them and from the people we least expect. What events may have been an epiphany for you? Epiphanies can also be moments of life changing events which are grace filled. What events have changed your life for the better?
