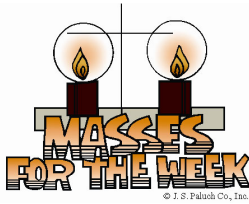

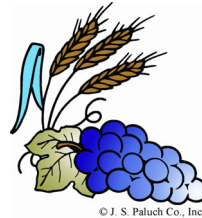

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Our Church is open each Wednesday from noon until 2:00 PM for private prayer.

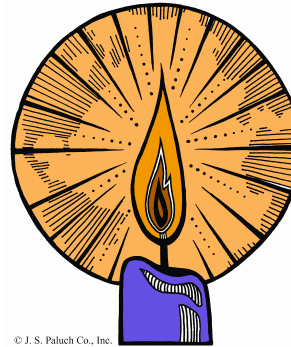

From the Pastor

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26th Sunday in Ordinary Time-Cycle C, “Parable of the rich man and poor Lazarus”

Dear Parish Family,

Although the theme of the parable is very simple to guess, we do not usually give ourselves the opportunity to think beyond its simplicity. Thinking about the gospel it is not just about money, gold and possessions but about ideas and words such as estrangement, feelings, desires and attachment (material, intellectual, or religious) that can help us to enrich its comprehension. Today’s gospel can invite us to reflect on what is the inner richness of our heart and how it is oriented. How much is my heart full of good works for those who need them most? The rich man lets a poor, hungry, sick and lonely person die next to him, at his door. However, in the logic of the parable, the one who boasts of being rich is before God and in reality a poor person. Consequently, we can ask ourselves: how many times have we boasted and satisfied ourselves in front of the poverty and nothingness of others? The meaning of this question is not merely material. One might think about being available to listen to my neighbor, the immigrant and others.

The life of the rich man whose name we do not know ends in the grave which is the “hades” or hell of failure. I would dare to think that we do not know his name because the gospel suggests that probably one of us can fit into the story and be in time to meditate on one’s own condition. But what does this parable of the rich man mean? Is it bad to be rich? Is receiving inheritance or having possessions something that carries a certain negativity? Certainly not. On the contrary, the gospel like every Sunday summons us to a more genuine attitude in our lives.

The gospel invites us to open ourselves to the greatness of God, who cares for all the sick and lost of the earth; that is why, with death, his treasure is revealed there in Abraham’s bosom. The dominant theme underneath the parable is what our relationship to wealth and our capacity for detachment is like. Wealth can mean a variety of things to which we can be attached. Commonly today’s society views wealth from different perspectives, however it flows to the same point. Today’s society seeks to rename it and surround it as “happiness”. Nonetheless, it is a society that rushes to the goal, to the end product, to the market, to success, to light-living and misses a center point: the otherness. Then, the living Jesus must bring us to the understanding of the world and eternal life asking ourselves these questions: can we order our priorities so as to reflect the value we place in our relationship with Christ and others? How is my relationship between my own wealth (includes happiness) and the proposal that the gospel brings us? Am I honest with myself about these things and the movements that the word of God inspires? Are there concrete attachments that lead me away from the Lord and the truth of his Gospel? How might the Lord call me to re-examine these attachments wherever direction they might go? Where am I concretely tempted to compromise the integrity of my identity as a Christian, even when I am aware of the needs of others?

Furthermore, the context of the gospel insinuates that Abraham’s dialogue with the rich man about his death is due to his ignorance. We believe this judgment is inaccurate. However, the rich man is not condemned in general for his wealth, but for the fact that he did not know how to receive life as a gift, forgetting to offer his help to the poor, the sick and the hungry. In other words, wealth taken by itself is not a sin, but wealth that leaves the poor to die is undoubtedly a sin, as is the lack of solidarity that divides peoples and causes some to swim in abundance while others languish in their world of hunger and misery.

The rich man is assured that he will go down to hell (hades). This means that his life has ended in failure. No more society’s success, no more end product, goals, light-living or market. He has closed himself up in his interests, in his blind richness, in his attachments, so that when he comes before God, which is where love is, he finds himself useless and empty, condemned. How many times have we felt that emptiness in our life and have preferred to fill it with other things rather than with the benefit of helping those in need?

Even though condemnation does not mean a punishment from God who imposes himself and dictates his arbitrary judgment at the end of life; condemnation is the end of the man who has chosen a from of existence contrary to the mystery of God and of life, to remain without the grace of God that saves, to remain without the encounter of love towards others. Perhaps thinking of the last days and of the richness can lead us to a final question: In what way do I want my communion with the Lord to grow every day? Surely by being in communion with others from the starting point of dialogue, help and friendship with the needy. “Though our Lord Jesus Christ was rich, He became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich” (2Cor 8:9)

Who do we ignore, or avoid in our everyday life experience?
