

Dear Parish Family,

Today is the Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. We begin the Gospel with the words "His heart was moved with compassion for they were like sheep without a shepherd." The ministry of Jesus is one of compassion and mercy. Those who share in the ministry of Jesus also need to be moved by compassion for the people of God. Compassion is a willingness to have one's heart touched by the sufferings and the pain of another. Mercy means the willingness to suffer in one's heart for another. Love is the willing of good for another regardless of emotional or lack of emotional attachment. Compassion and mercy are how love manifests itself through us for another. Compassion, mercy and love are just feelings. They are calls to action on behalf of another.

What must the heart of Jesus feel for us this day? Are we too sheep without a shepherd? We are stressed beyond limits. We seem to have no peace in our hectic lives. In so many ways, we are harming ourselves. We are running here, we are running there all in hope of making ourselves or others happy, but in reality, we are tired and exhausted and have little or no time for rest, for spirituality or even Mass on Sunday.

God may love us but do we love ourselves enough to ask ourselves what really matters? The Gospel calls out to us to save us from sin and ourselves, but we are too busy. This situation is found in every walk of life including religious life, priestly life, single life, married life, professional life and even in children. We are like those who moved the heart of Jesus because we, like sheep without a shepherd, we are scattered emotionally, physically and spiritually.

In the Gospel Jesus calls us to a better lifestyle that saves us from sin and from ourselves. In the Gospel Jesus gives his Apostles a task to cure the sick, raise the dead heal the leper and expel demons. Wow, that's a tall order. Look at our society, perhaps Jesus is on to something here. How many of us need to be healed physically, emotionally, spiritually? How many relationships need to be healed through reconciliation? How many families have fallen apart due to need for healing? How many of us are dead? We are breathing, yet we are not living. We go through our routine of life but no spark of life due to many reasons. Can a vibrant faith life rather than just a ritualized religious practice create new life in a person? How many of us have ostracized people from our lives? We write people off because they may not agree with us, see life differently or even see social convention differently. Who are the lepers in our lives and how do we reach out to them in a healing gesture? How many suffer from demons? Yes, there are many types of demons. Some suffer from the demon of self-abasement, fears, anxieties, jealousies and general unhappiness. How many of us just cannot be grateful? How can we be a person who for the sake of Christ, not for the sake of popularity or to win acclaim, make life better for at least one person in the many worlds in which we live.

The apostles were enthralled with Jesus. Their relationship with him both individually and as community was life giving to them so much so that it moved them to be better people while helping others to see clearly the mystery of the Gospel. Did the relationship with Jesus not create in them a heart moved with compassion?
