

# From the Pastor

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Dear Parish Family,

Today, the Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, the theme of Wisdom seems to unite the Liturgy of the Word. In the first reading from the First Book of Kings, we read Solomon's prayer for wisdom. We also read God's response to the prayer. Wisdom is more than knowledge. It is seeing our surroundings, the events in our lives, our successes and our failures, our joys and our pains as God sees them. Wisdom is a gift from God. In the Gospel reading we continue the discussion about the Kingdom of God. Jesus is smart. He uses images to which people may relate to explain to them the meaning of the Kingdom of God. Ultimately, for us, Jesus is the wisdom of God.

The second reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans picks up on the Divine Wisdom theme. In this passage Paul says: Brothers and Sisters: "We know that all things work for the good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose." What is Paul saying in this passage? Does this mean that no matter what is happening in our lives, all things will work out and make us happy? What does it mean to say who are called according to his purpose." To understand Paul, we must understand his prayer life. Paul's prayer life was a conversation between him and the mind and heart of Jesus Christ. Paul's conversation was not a one time event. Paul's prayer life was a union with Christ. Paul's conversion processes continued throughout his life. Paul continually grew in his relationship with Jesus. Solomon sought wisdom. For us, Jesus is the Wisdom of God among us.

In this passage Paul tells us that we are called to love God. The act of loving is itself a grace. It is God's grace which allows us to love God. If we love God, than we trust that all will work out to his purpose. God's purpose is good because those who love God, trust God. Here we are called to a deeper conversion with the mind and heart of the Lord. The goal of this continuous conversation with the mind and heart of Jesus is that we may grow to will what God wills. This is true for all situations and events. It is true of the world, the church and in our personal lives. We may not understand this in every situation but we believe that all is for the growing of the Kingdom of God. For example, look at the death of Christ. Those surrounding the cross did not understand how this tragedy could possible be for the good of the world, let alone them or Jesus. For those who love God, they trust that all will accomplish God's good purpose. St. Theresa Lisieux said "Everything is a grace. Everything is the direct effect of our Father's love, difficulties, contradictions, humiliations, all the soul's miseries, burdens, needs. Everything is a grace because everything is through them the soul learns humility, realizes its weakness. Everything is a grace because everything is God's gift. Whatever be the character of life or its unexpected events, to the heart that loves, all is well."

Are we growing in our relationship with Christ to speak as did Theresa or Paul? Can we see the Kingdom of God is present here and now wherever people are living out the Gospel? The Kingdom of God is present whenever and wherever we find: mercy, kindness, self-giving, genuine love and caring and the courage to speak out for the voiceless. The Kingdom of God will be completed when Jesus returns. At that time, all the good done by those who followed the Gospel message will be completed and brought to perfection. Do we see ourselves called to love so as to will all that God wants in our lives and in the lives of others? Can I trust God so deeply? Conversion is ongoing. It is more than just saying prayers or fulfilling obligations. It is growing to love and trust the Lord with our lives that the Kingdom of God becomes a reality in our lives.
