

From the Pastor

CHRIST WITHIN US

Dear Parish Community,

Today is the Feast of the Transfiguration. Transfiguration means to change, to give a new and exalted spiritual appearance. This feast is very much part of Easter. It is an explanation of the faith of the early Christians. The Transfiguration is a proclamation that the Hebrew texts were symbolized by the presence of Moses and Elijah bears witness to Christ. The presence of the mysterious voice of God reminds us of the event of Jesus' baptism. Jesus is the beloved of God upon whom God's presence rests. In Hebrew we call this divine presence Shekhinah. This Divine presence was found in the Temple. The Transfiguration points out the Divine presence the Shekhinah is found in Jesus who is the new temple of God. Through the mystery of the Incarnation, we believe that Christ Jesus is both divine and human. Events such as the Transfiguration and the Resurrection highlight the divine nature of Jesus. In the Transfiguration, Jesus allows his disciples to glimpse into eternity. The Transfiguration stands in sharp contrast to the disfiguration of the sufferings and death of Jesus.

I find this Gospel story to be hope filled. I thought of the passage found in Colossians 1:26 " the mystery hidden from ages and from generations past. But now it has been manifested in his holy one ...it is Christ in you." Christ dwells in us and we are the Church through the sacraments, through faith and absolutely through the Eucharist. Just as the divinity of Jesus seems hidden, so too the divine presence in us, the Church, can seem hidden. Yet at times we know that God is present in us and through us. This is particularly true at Liturgy and at moments of sufferings. The Lord of Calvary is the same Lord of the Transfiguration and Resurrection. This Church is sinful and sometimes it is difficult to perceive the presence of God in the humanity of the Church. Yet, the Lord of the sinful Church is the Lord of the faithful and glorious church. In the end, the church will be transfigured and the body of Christ (us) will be beautiful and radiant. The story of the Transfiguration tells us the human situation can be filled with the divine. Everyone is on a faith journey. Our faith journey goes to the very depths of who we are before ourselves and God. We are making a journey to the ever deepening discovery of Christ within ourselves and our neighbor.

There are terrible situations which we may find ourselves enduring. We may think that our lives, or relationships, or hopes and our future seems ruined or lost. Yet, with God all things can change for the better. Dire situations can be opportunities for new growth and transfiguration. The sacrament of the Eucharist is the sacrament of Transfiguration. The Eucharist is the food for our journey to our hearts. Knowing, believing, reflecting upon and praying, we can come to truly appreciate this loving Eucharistic presence. Through the Eucharist, healing of the spirit can happen. Growth in the life of Christ is possible. The Lord Jesus can be more the center of our lives. Christ can shine through us, transfiguring you and me.
