

Dear Parish Family,

Today's reading is challenging. They continue the theme of reconciliation which began last Sunday. Perhaps we can sum up the lesson for today in the following points. First, Do not pray for something from God which you deny to others. Second, Let go of wrath, anger hurt and resentments, instead seek healing and forgiveness and mercy. Thirdly, Learn to forgive yourself, if you cannot forgive yourself, you cannot forgive anyone else. The fourth point Contrary to the American and New York way of thinking, your life does not belong to you alone. Your life is in relationship with many other lives. You are not alone, you are part of a wide network of relationships.

The first reading is from the Book of Sirach. This text is part of the Wisdom Literature of the Hebrew Text. (The Book of Sirach does not appear in the Jewish Canon of scripture, but does appear in the Catholic Bible.) The text studies ordinary life situations and asks the question "How do I live wisely?" The author in this portion recommends letting go of anger, resentment and hurt. Once a hurt is addressed, let it go. If one holds on to these feelings, it can lead to violence and revenge. Such a situation would not make life easy or wise.

From my pastoral experience, I have found that while people complain of how hurt they are or have been, they refuse to let go of the feelings and they keep it always uppermost in their memory. Thus they allow the past hurt to control their present and it never disappears. Consequently, they never experience peace. However, it seems that we like our hurts and our anger. Yes, many of us love to keep telling the story over and over again so we get sympathy and attention. When we tell the story we are always seeing ourselves as right and the other as wrong. If this is your habit, pray for grace to let it go. Then you may have peace. Also pray to see your part in the hurt inflected. Forgive yourself and move on.

In the second reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans we are reminded that we are not simply individuals. A common expression in our language particularly among the young is "This is my life and I can do whatever I want." This is not true. Our lives belong first to God. This gift from God is networked with many other lives. We are people of relationships. We are people in relationships. What one does with his/her life does affect many others for good or ill. So, being people in relationships means that we will have many opportunities to disagree with others, to be in conflict with others and to reconcile with others. Being in relationship with others we grow and learn from our mutual benefits. Reconciliation is part of the relationships, it is not extraneous to relationships.

In the Gospel, the message is clear. Do not ask for forgiveness or mercy or kindness from God if you refuse mercy, kindness and forgiveness to others. So, if you seek patience from God, then show patience to another. If you seek a particular healing or care of your family, then be a sign of healing for someone else. The graces you seek from God, try to be that grace for someone else. In this way, you are not the center of your prayer, rather the Lord and his commandment are the center of prayer.
