

Dear Parish Community,

Advent 2024- A Blessed New Liturgical Year to you. It is Advent again for the first time.

Today we begin Advent. The word advent means to come. Thus, the Liturgical season of Advent invites us to focus our attention on the two comings of Christ. From now until December 17th, the sacred text of the season focuses on the coming of Christ at the end of time. These first two weeks have as their goal the focus on the Kingdom of God. This time period accents the line from the Creed which says "we believe in the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come" as well as the statement at the acclamation of faith after the consecration which professes belief in the return of Jesus. The readings refer to this second coming as a time of judgment and the final victory of good over evil.

The second part of Advent beginning on December 17th moves our focus to the Incarnation of God among us in the person of Jesus. Jesus is the Kingdom of God. It is during this time period the readings move us to familiar Christmas themes.

The Advent atmosphere in Church has a theme of waiting in joyful expectation. We have an Advent Wreath which is a way of marking our time while waiting. There are four candles which are placed in a pine or evergreen wreath. There are four candles corresponding to the four Sundays of Advent. There are three violet colored candles and one rose colored candle. The color violet is worn for advent. The color violet represents a number of liturgical themes. Violet is the color for preparation through penance. Violet represents hope that what is expected will be fulfilled. The vestments of the priest and wall banners in the sanctuary will be violet. The three violet candles represent the first, second and fourth Sunday of Advent. The rose colored candle represents the third Sunday of Advent which is called Gaudate Sunday or Sunday of Joy because the time of fulfillment is at hand.

Light is a symbol both of Advent, Christmas and Easter. During Advent the daylight is short. It gets dark early in the day. The sun rises later in the morning, therefore there is a longing for light. Light breaks the darkness of the long nights. If you are awake between 5:00 AM and 6 AM, you will notice how the first signs of light slowly appear in the east while the western sky is still dark. The light gradually fills the sky moving west until day is fully arrived. So too, with the coming of the Lord, the world lay in darkness and the light who is Christ breaks in upon us. This light breaking in is similar to the gradual coming of the Kingdom of God. While God's Kingdom is here in Jesus and the Church, it is still coming to its fullness. While the Kingdom of God still struggles to overcome evil and is not completely here yet, in the end day fully arrives. Christ did arrive and he will arrive again. The Kingdom of God will be successful even if we do not yet see its fullness.
