

# From the Pastor

**Dear Parish Community,** 

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent. The giving of a New Covenant, the establishment of a new relationship between God and humanity is the setting theme of today's Liturgy of the Word. This New Covenant, this new relationship between God and humanity comes about through the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus. It is for this Hour that Jesus has come, the Hour of his glorification through Death to Resurrection.

The Great Paschal Mystery is pointed to in the second reading from the Letter to the Hebrews and the Gospel. In the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah, the prophet announces that God will male a New Covenant with the people. This new covenant will be different from the past. This new covenant will be written in the hearts of the people. Christianity sees this promise of the New Covenant fulfilled in Christ who is the new covenant. In the second reading from Hebrews and the Gospel we have an allusion to the prayer of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. In Hebrews we are told that Jesus prayed with tears and supplications. In the Gospel according to St. John we read that Jesus was troubled because his hour had come. The New Covenant will come to be through the Blood of Christ. Blood means life. The covenant or the relationship we have with God is in Jesus.

In a covenant is a special relationship. During this Lenten Season we read about the covenant between God and the world in the story of Noah. We read about the covenant between Abraham and God in the story of the sacrifice of Isaac. We read about the relationship and covenant with Moses with the giving of the Ten Commandments. In each covenant people, both as a group and individually encountered God.

The New Covenant is communal and individual. Our Covenant is not in a written text. Our covenant is not a series of Laws. Our covenant is in a person. It is in the person of Christ Jesus, the Incarnate Word of God that we encounter God and have our New Covenant. All are invited into this New Covenant. The way into this covenant and redemption in Christ is through the Sacrament of Baptism. Baptism is nourished by the Eucharist. Jesus becomes sin for us. This means that Jesus is the victim of hatred, jealousy, religious self-righteousness, greed for power, rejection. It is because of Christ's faithfulness to the Will of the Father. The Will of the Father is not willing Jesus' death but rather the Father wills love, mercy, justice, peace, joy, goodness, faithfulness, humility, kindness, chastity, gentleness, generosity, self-control, forgiveness throughout his life and during his passion Jesus has been faithful to these behaviors. We are redeemed and forgiven because where humanity was and is unfaithful, Jesus is most faithful. His faithfulness to all God wants redeems our unfaithfulness.

Being a committed member of the Body of Christ calls us to renounce certain behaviors which are against the Gospel and to adhere to other behaviors which foster the Gospel. This commitment can cause us to make difficult choices for the gospel and to suffer for those choices. This suffering can take the form of being ostracized by peers, being mocked by the nominal Catholic or unbeliever and even being rejected by others.

Suffering for the Gospel message is part of life of the would be disciple. In light of the Passion, Death & Resurrection of Christ what really matters? In light of the Paschal Mystery of Christ how do we prioritize our lives? In light of the love of Christ Jesus, where do we stand? Is the celebration of the Paschal Mystery just the remembering of an historical event in the life of Christ or is it our lived experience? Is it our very life and why?
