



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From the Dear Parish Community.

Today, Passion Sunday also known as Palm Sunday begins Holy Week. This Pastor week is a solemn week in the liturgical and spiritual life of the Church. During this time we celebrate the Passion, Death and Resurrection of the Lord Jesus. (The Paschal Mystery) These events make up the foundation of our faith. It is through the Paschal Mystery that we know the great depth mystery of the Incarnation of God among us in

Christ Jesus. This week is called Holy because it celebrates the re-creation of the universe redeemed through the Pascal Mystery. While the Book of Genesis tells us about Creation as God's great gift to us, this week tells us the greatest gift of God is the Incarnation of God among us known as Jesus and his great work of Redemption.

Today, Passion Sunday, is so named because we proclaim the Passion of the Lord that begins this great Holy Week. The Liturgy of Passion Sunday begins with the blessing and distribution of Palm Branches. This act recalls the entrance of Jesus into the City of Jerusalem. The palm branches represented welcome and victory. Today the Palm Branch is a sign of Christ's Victory over death. We place these branches in our homes as a reminder of Christ's Victory and our desire to follow Jesus. Since the Palm Branch is a sign of Christ's victory over death, placing Palm Branches on graves and tombs is most appropriate.

Holy Thursday is the celebration of the Supper of the Lord and therefore the great gifts of Eucharist, Holy Orders and Ministry as Service are highlighted in the Holy Thursday celebration. While every celebration of the Eucharist is the Supper of the Lord, on this night there is greater attention placed on the memory of the Last Supper. During this liturgy feet will be washed as a sign of service, the newly consecrated Sacred Oils used for the Anointing of the Sick, the Anointing of Catechumens and Confirmation, Priestly and Episcopal ordinations as well as the dedications of Churches will be presented. At the end of the Mass, we will process to the place of repose with the Blessed Sacrament. In this place of repose, we are invited to adore the Lord present in the Eucharist. Catholics believe that Jesus is truly present in this Eucharist. Therefore, spending time in prayer before this sacrament is spending time with the Lord.

Good Friday remembers the death of Jesus. So solemn is this day, we do not celebrate Mass, we read the Passion and receive Eucharist which was consecrated on Holy Thursday. This is a day of sorrow, yet hope in victory of Christ over suffering and death.

Holy Saturday. This too is a solemn day. No Mass is celebrated on this day. The day is spent in silence and we are invited to reflect again on the life-giving Passion of the Lord. Saturday evening is the Great Holy Vigil of Easter. I invite you to attend this event. Never mind about the length of the service. The challenge is worth it. It is the great conclusion to the events of Holy Week. Hear the readings, light the new fire in your heart, renew the promises of your baptism, enter into the hope of the season and forget the time.

The celebration is timeless. It is this great event of the Resurrection which makes us a people of Hope.

PALM SUNDAY ALSO KNOWN AS PASSION SUNDAY

Why do we have Palm on Palm Sunday? We have Palm on Palm Sunday because the beginning of the Liturgy remembers the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Palm is a sign of victory. Those who carry the Palm are waving Christ onto the victory of the Messiah.

Why do we bring Palm to the cemetery? We bring Palm to the cemetery because Palm is a sign of victory over death. Jesus wins this victory in his resurrection. Notice the statue of St. Stephen, St. Lucy in our church. Notice they are holding palm. They were Martyrs. Their deaths are seen as a victory for the faith.

Why do we keep Palm in our homes? We keep Palm in our homes to remind us always of the victory of Christ over death and sin.

Why is this week called Holy Week? This week is called Holy Week because we will celebrate in word and sacrament the re-creation of a world redeemed in the passion, death and resurrection of Christ.
