

From the Pastor

Dear Parish Family,

Today, the Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time, the readings suggest to me three words: universality, discipline and practice. In the first reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah we read the final prophecy of Isaiah. In this text the Israelites who have a special covenant with God that a time will come when even the gentile nations will have a part in God's covenant. Good and righteous people from all nations will come together with the people of Israel and worship one God. In the Gospel reading Jesus tells his disciples that the special relationship that they enjoyed with Jesus, that is those who ate and drank with Jesus is no guarantee of salvation. Salvation goes to those who lived the Gospel message. Those who lived the Gospel message will come from north and south, east and west and enter the Kingdom of God while those thinking they are most prepared to enter will not enter. Finally the lesson is: discipleship demands discipline. Being a follower of Iesus is not an easy road. The road to Jesus is made of a constant striving for perfection. Discipline is a rough word. It means learning It means corrections. It means humility to learn from our errors. boundaries. listening to the will of another and placing our own will at the disposal of another, in this case Christ. This is a lifelong process which never ends.

How do we hear such scriptures in our day? What do they mean to us? I can only answer these questions from my own experience. They tell me that those who are open to discipleship and to the discipline of the Word of God and act upon the Word in their lives are in good stead of salvation. Those who think that because I am Catholic or because I belong to such and such denomination, or who have special positions in the religious community have some upper hand on salvation are gravely mistaken. So, just because I am a priest or a bishop or the pope, just because I am a sister or brother or I am a lector or a deacon or extraordinary minister of the Holy Eucharist does not mean my salvation is guaranteed. It means I hold a position. For EVERYONE is called to deeper conversion to the Gospel. If we are not practicing the faith we show externally, we are missing the point. It is possible to be a priest or bishop and even the pope and never to have heard, know or have followed the Gospel. In the end it will be a surprise. Those who we think have a right to salvation will be surprised by those who actually enter the Kingdom of God. Those who were looked down upon may be the very people whose hearts were deeply converted to the Lord and who practiced their faith in Christ through charitable deeds.

So, where am I? I am trying. Not always succeeding, but always seeking mercy. Where are you?
